# Tougaloo Alumnus Representative Bennie Thompson Leads Historic January 6th Committee Hearings

As the gavel pounded the dais in the Canon Office Building to bring to order to the historic January 6th Hearings, at the helm, was Tougaloo College alumnus, the Honorable Bennie Thompson. History will perhaps show that this is his most crucial role as he serves his 13th term in the United States House of Representatives ensuring that democracy is preserved in the United States of America. Thompson represents the Second Congressional District in Mississippi. Appointed Chair of the January



6th Committee in 2021 by Speaker of the House, Rep. Nancy Pelosi, Rep. Thompson, along with other members of the January 6th Committee, has worked tirelessly to uncover how the insurrection on the United States Capitol happened, who was involved and, most importantly, what role former President Donald Trump played in its organization. The hearings officially kicked off on Thursday, June 9, 2022 during prime-time television. All major networks covered the opening hearing except FOX News. For the record, the TAB editorial staff, understanding the momentous significance of the historical nature of the hearings, felt it was fitting to share with other alumni the moving and factual opening remarks of Rep. Thompson.

Opening statement as prepared for delivery June 9, 2022

The Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the United States Capitol will be in order.

Without objection, the Chair is authorized to declare the Committee in recess at any point.

Pursuant to House Deposition Authority Regulation 10, the Chair announces the Committee's approval to release the deposition materials presented during tonight's hearing.

Thanks to everyone watching tonight for sharing part of your evening, to learn about the facts and causes of the events leading up to and including the violent attack on January 6th, 2021 ... on our democracy, electoral system, and country.

I am Bennie Thompson, Chairman of the January 6th, 2021 Committee. I was born, raised and still live in Bolton, Mississippi,

town with a population of 521, which is midway between Jackson and Vicksburg, MS, and the Mississippi River.

I am from a part of the country where people justified the actions of slavery, the Ku Klux Klan and lynching. I'm reminded of that dark history as I hear voices today try and justify the actions of the insurrectionists on January 6th, 2021.

Over the next few weeks, hopefully you will get to know the other Members, my colleagues up here, and me. We represent a diversity of communities from all over the United States... rural areas and cities... east coast, west coast, and the heartland.

All of us have one thing in common: we swore the same oath. The same oath that all Members of Congress take upon taking office and afterward every two years if they are reelected.

We swore an oath to defend the Constitution, against all enemies: foreign ... <u>and</u> <u>domestic</u>.

The words of the current oath taken by all of us—that nearly every United States Government employee takes—have their roots in the Civil War.

Throughout our history, the United States has fought against foreign enemies to preserve our democracy, electoral system, and country. When the United States Capitol was stormed and burned in 1814, foreign enemies were responsible.

Afterward, in 1862, when American citizens had taken up arms against this country, Congress adopted a new oath to help make sure no person who had supported the rebellion could hold a position of public trust. Therefore, congresspersons and U.S. Federal Government employees were required for the first time to swear an oath to defend the Constitution against all enemies—foreign... and domestic.

That oath was put to the test on January 6th, 2021.

The police officers who held the line that day honored their oaths. Many came out of that day bloodied and broken. They still bear those wounds, visible and invisible. They did their duty. They repelled the mob and ended the occupation of the Capitol. They defended the Constitution against domestic enemies—so that Congress could return, uphold our own oaths, and count your votes to ensure the transfer of power—just as



we've done for hundreds of years.

But unlike in 1814, it was **domestic** enemies of the Constitution who stormed and occupied the Capitol... who sought to thwart the will of the people...to stop the transfer of power.

And they did so at the encouragement of the President of the United States. The President of the United States. Trying to stop the transfer of power.

A precedent that had stood for 220 years, even as our democracy has faced its most difficult tests.

Thinking back again to the Civil War, in the summer of 1864, the President of the United States was staring down what he believed would be a doomed bid for reelection. He believed his opponent, General George McClellan, would wave the white flag when it came to preserving the Union. But even with that grim fate hanging in the balance, President Lincoln was ready to accept the will of the voters, come what may.

He made a quiet pledge.

He wrote down the words, "This morning, as for some days past, it seems exceedingly probable that this Administration will not be re-elected. Then it will be my duty to so co-operate with the President elect...."

*It will be my duty.* 

Lincoln sealed that memo and asked his cabinet secretaries to sign it, sight unseen. He asked them to make the same commitment he did. To accept defeat if indeed de



















## The 17th Annual Two Rivers Gala

With a mission to engage the campus community as well as the broader community in meaningful work that builds a more just, inclusive, and equitable society, Vice President Chamberlain provides executive oversight to the Reuben V. Anderson Institute for Social Justice. established after the 2020 murder of George Floyd, and to Tougaloo's almost 60-year partnership with

Brown University in Providence, RI. Additional initiatives include the Institute for the Study of Modern-Day Slavery, the James Loewen Racial Justice Education & Research Initiative, and Tougaloo's partnership with the Mississippi Department of Archives & History. The Office of Career Pathways | Career Services and the Federal TRIO Programs also report directly to her.

She has a strong commitment to sustaining Tougaloo's social justice legacy. Under her leadership, the Division of Social Sciences moved toward establishing an African American President for Finance and Admin-Studies degree-granting program, established the Eric V. istration/CFO. Holder Public Policy Program via the Reuben V. Anderson Institute for Social Justice, and has received approximately Bowens will begin her position at \$3.5 million in grants for the Institute and other initiatives.

Since her appointment, she has awarded 18 social justice scholarships through the Reuben V. Anderson Institute for Social Justice, executed two conferences and several special guest talks, engaged students in various social justice initiatives, identified a theme to strengthen the Brown-Tougaloo partnership, and planned a Summer 2022 Faculty Institute, among other projects.

Dr. Chamberlain was recently honored as the 2022 Mississippi Humanities Council "Scholar of the Year" and was elected President of the Mississippi Historical Society at the March 2022 annual meeting. ## **Retool Your School 2022: A Historic Win for Tougaloo College!**

The Retool Your School Program, an initiative of The Home Depot, provides Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) the opportunity to upgrade their campuses. In 2022, The Home Depot awarded thirty (30) campus improvement awards ranging between the amounts of \$20,000-\$75,000, and Tougaloo received one of them, making the college a multi-year winner.

This year's award will fund the revitalization of historic Pope Cottage. Built in 1881, it is the second oldest facility on Tougaloo's campus, with the first oldest being the John W. Boddie House (Tougaloo Mansion). Pope Cottage currently serves as the academic and instructional facility for students studying broadcast journalism, marketing, and mass communications. It is one of the cornerstones of historical structures on the college campus and is also listed on the national registry for historic places.

In previous years, The Retool Your School Program has funded renovations to A.A. Branch Hall and Renner Hall.

## We Are The Champions!



After a first-round bye and two games later, the Bulldogs have claimed the 2022 GCAC (Gulf Coast Athletic Conference) Basketball Tournament Championship. This is the Bulldogs' first tournament title since 2019, when the Bulldogs captured both the regular season and tournament titles.

After the first-round bye, the Bulldogs faced Edward Waters University in the semifinals of the GCAC Tournament. In the Tigers' finale in the GCAC, the Bulldogs defeated the Tigers 69-64 to advance to the championship game. Cameron Copeland led the Bulldogs with 14 points. Antwan Beans, Cameron Woodall and Trajan Fielder all followed with 11 points and Darryl Jones added 10 points.

In the championship game, the Bulldogs faced off against Philander Smith College. In the regular season, the Bulldogs fell short in both meetings with the Panthers and they both share the GCAC Regular Season Championship, but as the saying goes, it is hard to beat a team three times and the Bulldogs proved this statement to be true as the revenge over the Panthers was sweet in a 59-55 victory to claim the tournament championship. Cameron Copeland led the Bulldogs with 19 points. Darryl Jones and Trajan Fielder followed with 11 points and Antwan Beans added 10 points for the Bulldogs.

Copeland was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. Both Antwan Beans and Darryl Jones were named to the All-Tournament Team.

In the opening round of the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) National Tournament, the Bulldogs faced off against #1 seeded Arizona Christian University in the Lakeland bracket hosted by Southeastern University. The Bulldogs put up a good fight but fell short to ACU 76-61 to end their 2022 campaign.

#### **Baseball Team Ends the Season in Historic Fashion**

The Bulldogs ended the 2022 campaign on a high and historic note. For the first time in Tougaloo baseball history, the Bull-

dogs played Division I SWAC Alabama A&M University.

The game was definitely one for the record books, as it was a true "Battle of the Bulldogs," but it was Tougaloo that prevailed and escaped with a season finale upset in a 9-8 10th inning victory over Alabama A&M. Simar Thomas came in and stole the win; pitching the last 2 innings and only giving up 1 run and had 1 strikeout.

Leading the Bulldogs to this historic win was Tyler Hickman with 4 hits and 2 RBIs. Christian Borders followed with 2 hits (including a triple), 3 runs and 2 RBIs. Bradford Patton ended his collegiate career with 2 hits (including a solo home run), 2 runs and 1 RBI. La'Nas Torrey had 2 hits, 1 run and 2 RBIs, Matt Jones had 2 hits, 2 runs and 1 RBI and freshman Khilan Magee had 2 hits and 1 run.

The Bulldogs ended the season 10-33.

### Tougaloo Athletics Adds Men's And Women's Soccer

The Tougaloo College Department of Athletics has announced the addition of men's and women's soccer beginning in the Fall of the 2022 - 23 school year.

This will be the first time the college has offered men's and women's soccer since the 80s. Realizing that soccer is gaining a lot more momentum around the country, the college administration wants to build this program to help foster diversity and attract more students, both domestic and international. The last program that existed at Tougaloo College was over 30 years ago. Tougaloo Women's Soccer will join the ranks of other HBCU soccer programs in the state of Mississippi like Jackson State, Alcorn State, and Mississippi Valley State. Tougaloo Men's Soccer will take on the mantle of being the only HBCU Men's Soccer program within the state of Mississippi. It would also be one of a very few HBCU Men's Soccer programs in the country alongside Howard University, Fisk University, Huston-Tillotson, Oakwood University, and Talladega College in Alabama.

"I really want to build a competitive program here at Tougaloo. It has always been my dream to coach soccer at an HBCU and now is that time," says Head Coach for men's and women's soccer at Tougaloo, Ahmad Smith. "I would like to prove that soccer not only exists in our state, but that we can compete in it as well. Though there are some barriers with establishing and growing the program, we will work to create our own opportunities here."

Tougaloo College Athletics Program is a member of the Gulf Coast Athletic Conference (GCAC), the Southern States Athletic Conference (SSAC) and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). Though the soccer program is currently "Independent" in status, the college plans to join the conference in the Fall of 2023. The team expects to play home matches at Central Jackson Soccer Organization (CJSO) near Callaway High School.

### Student-Athletes Excel In The Classroom During The 2021-2022 Academic Year

Not only did the Tougaloo College student-athletes compete on the playing surface, they also set the standard in the classroom. In the spring 2022 semester, over 40 student-athletes attained a 3.0 grade point average. To be exact, 43 studentathletes earned at least a 3.0 GPA with nine student-athletes earning a 4.0 GPA.

Collectively, Tougaloo College student-athletes attained a combined 2.78 grade point average for the Spring 2022 semester. With eight teams counted, including cheer and dance, five teams earned at least a 2.8 GPA led by Women's Cross Country (3.20) and Dance (3.10). Those teams were followed by Baseball (2.98), Women's Basketball (2.94) and Cheer Kierstin Salley, Volleyball, Bachelor of Arts in Health and (2.85).

Overall, for the 2021-2022 academic year, Tougaloo College student-athletes maintained a 3.03 grade point average with 49 student-athletes earning at least a 3.0 grade point average. Of those 49 student-athletes, three maintained a perfect 4.0 grade point average. For the 2021-2022 academic year, students in seven of the eight programs maintained at least a 2.8 grade







#### **TCNAA Overview**

What does TCNAA mean (acronym)? TCNAA means Tougaloo College National Alumni Association and is often referred to as the "Association."

What is the purpose and role of TCNAA? The purpose of TCNAA is to promote the mission, interests, purposes, and ideals of Tougaloo College, including recruitment and fundraising initiatives.

Who is the official spokesperson for TCNAA? The President of TCNAA is the official spokesperson of the Association.

Does TCNAA operate independently from the College? Yes, TCNAA is a separate 501 3(c) entity and operates independently from the College.

Does TCNAA provide input regarding the College's day-to-day operations/decisions/oversight? No, TCNAA does not provide any input to the day-to-day operations of the College.

What is the primary corporate/organizational structure of the TCNAA? TCNAA Board of Directors (which includes the Association's officers, Alumni Representatives to the College's Board of Trustees, Alumni Regional Representatives, and Chapter Presidents) and active alumni (those who have paid national dues).

How does the Association communicate and promote its mission statements? The Association communicates and promotes its mission statement through the TCNAA website, activities, social media platforms, and other initiatives.

What is the role of the TCNAA Alumni Representatives to the Tougaloo College Board of Trustees? The Alumni Representatives to the Tougaloo College Board of Trustees advocate for alumni interests while embracing their responsibilities and fiduciary duties as a College Trustee.

How does TCNAA support the College's fundraising efforts? The Association jointly supports the College's various fundraising efforts through gifts, scholarships, volunteerism including social media communication and promotions.

What activities/events does TCNAA support that benefits the College? TCNAA supports activities such as Pre-Alumni Council programs, UNCF National Alumni Council, Concert Choir tours, Commencement Activities, Annual Alumni Gathering and Banquet, and Alumni Hall of Fame Induction.

Does TCNAA have authority over alumni chapters manage-

ment and/or activities? Alumni Chapters fall under the direction of TCNAA pursuant to the Association's Chapter Guide. However, the Association does not manage or direct alumni chapter activities and events.

What is the purpose and role of the Division of Institutional Advancement also known as the Office of Institutional Advancement? The Division of Institutional Advancement facilitates the understanding, participation, and support of Tougaloo College's students, faculty, alumni, trustees, parents, friends, corporations, foundations, legislators, and others who have an interest in promoting and supporting the College.

What is the purpose and role of the Office of Alumni Relations? The Office of Alumni Relations serves as the intermediary between the College and the alumni through the Division of Institutional Advancement and work closely with TCNAA to maintain the integrity of the Tougaloo College legacy.

## Membership

Are all Tougaloo College alumni automatically members of TCNAA? No, Tougaloo alumni are not automatic members of TCNAA. Alumni may become members of TCNAA by paying the Association membership dues.

How can I become a member of TCNAA? To become a member, please visit the TCNAA.org website and click the membership tab.

Can I join TCNAA, if I am not a member of an alumni chapter? Yes, you can join TCNAA if you are not a member of an alumni chapter. However, chapter participation is encouraged.

What are the benefits or benefits of becoming a member of TCNAA? TCNAA membership fosters full engagement, connections, collaboration, and voting privileges on matters pertaining to TCNAA. Currently, benefits include membership acknowledgment and college bookstore discounts.

Are membership dues required to be a voting member of TCNAA? Yes, TCNAA dues must be paid to become a voting member.

What are the TCNAA membership categories and dues? The TCNAA membership categories and dues are as follows:

## TOUGALOO COLLEGE | TAX TIPS | TYPES OF CONTRIBUTIONS

Tougaloo College accepts three types of contributions: cash, noncash, and in-kind

Cash contributions include payments made by cash, check, electronic funds transfer, online payment service, debit card, credit card, payroll deduction, or transfer of a gift card redeemable for cash;

Noncash contributions are property with no restriction placed on them. This includes publicly traded stock, clothing, wine collections, art, jewelry, antiques, collectible, automobiles, boats, recreational vehicles, and even your home. The amount of your deduction is generally the donated property's "fair market value". The job of determining worth is the responsibility of the donor;

In-kind contributions are gifts of tangible goods or services that alleviate costs to Tougaloo College. Examples of in-kind gifts include:

- Goods like computers, software, furniture, and office equipment.
- Services such as meeting space, photocopy and mail services, and administrative/financial support.
- Expertise like legal, tax, or business advice, marketing and website development, and strategic planning.

## TOUGALOO COLLEGE | TAX TIPS | IN-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS

What is or is not an in-kind gift to the College can be a point of confusion.

In-kind contributions are gifts of tangible goods or services that alleviate costs to Tougaloo College and can be used to advance Tougaloo's mission.

Examples of in-kind gifts include:

- Goods like computers, software, furniture, and office equipment;
- Services such as meeting space, photocopy and mail services, an administrative/financial support;
- Expertise like legal, tax, or business advice, marketing and website development, and strategic planning.

Please note that such contributed services cannot be counted as a gift and do not qualify as a charitable tax deduction to the donor. However, a donor of services may be able to deduct expenses incurred while performing said services. In such cases, please consult with a trusted tax advisor.

#### Contributions that may be mistaken for in-kind include:

- Tuition and/or related educational costs for an identified needy or worthy student;
- Direct scholarships to identified students; Travel expenses to and from official Tougaloo College events; Value of your time and/or services;

• Personal expenses incurred while volunteering.

## TOUGALOO'S TAX TIPS | CONTRIBUTIONS TO COVER STUDENTS' EXPENSES

As the 2021-2022 academic year ends, Tougaloo College is appreciative to all donors. As a private institution, contributions from our donors play an integral part in providing a quality education to our students.

According to IRS Publication 526, contributions earmarked for a particular student are not charitable contributions, and therefore not tax deductible. "You can't deduct contributions to specific individuals, including contributions to individuals who are needy or worthy. You can't deduct these contributions even if you make them to a qualified organization for the benefit of a specific person. But you can deduct a contribution to a qualified organization that helps needy or worthy individuals if you don't indicate that your contribution is for a specific person." ## TOUGALOO COLLEGE | TAX TIPS | END OF YEAR CONTRIBUTIONS

The calendar fiscal year ends at 11:59 pm on **Tuesday**, **December 31**. In order for your gift to be considered a 2020 tax year gift, it must be made, received, and/or postmarked by Thursday, December 31.

Hand delivered gifts: For gifts that are hand delivered to Tougaloo College, the delivery date is the date we actually receive the gift. Hand delivered gifts must be received by December 18, 2022. Tougaloo College will close about December 18, 2022 for the Winter Break.

**Credit Card Gifts:** You are encouraged to make credit card gifts to Tougaloo at <a href="www.tougaloo.edu/">www.tougaloo.edu/</a> as these gifts can be made even when the College is closed.

**Gifts Sent by Check:** The IRS considers a charitable gift made by check complete at the time the check is delivered or mailed, and the postmark is the evidence of the gift date.

Please mail contributions to Tougaloo College, Office of Institutional Advancement, 500 West County Line Road, Tougaloo, MS 39174. Gifts delivered by overnight courier, e.g., Federal Express, UPS, and others, are deemed to have been made when they are delivered.
